CREATE CATEGORIES Start your organizing efforts on a macro level. Divide papers into piles based on "big" classifications like Health, Finances, Taxes and School, then order by date and file accordingly.

GO PAPERLESS Streamline by converting as many checks, bank statements and credit card bills as possible into digital format. Rely on free tech tools like Evernote (an app and site that digitally organizes everything from finances to recipes and travel papers) and Dropbox (basically an online storage unit you can use to house files securely) to help everything find its place. Bonus: Both of these services are GH Institute-vetted!

MAKE A WEEKLY DATE Give yourself homework! Setting aside time to sit down and maintain your system — whether by backing up files or updating financial spreadsheets — will ensure that it stays in place long-term. The more you check in, the less scary the pile of work will be, so do so frequently during "peak" times (like tax season and the end of the year).
